[1] Only angiosarcoma of the liver is strongly associated with any of the contaminants at Camp Lejeune (vinyl chloride). Hepatocellular carcinoma is the result of infection with Hepatitis B or C.

[2] Acute Myelogenous (non-lymphocytic) Leukemia is causally associated with exposure to Benzene. All other leukemias/lymphomas are only weakly associated with any of the contaminants.

[3] Lung Cancer is primarily caused by exposure to cigarette smoke. In the presence of exposure to cigarette smoke over many years, the exposure to contaminants in the water would likely not outweigh the risk from smoking. This is also true, to a lesser extent, for bladder cancer.
